Dues Schedule

Any member of Local 18, 18A, 18B, 18C, 18D, 18G, 18RA or 18S who does not have his/her current dues paid may be suspended. Dues are payable on a quarterly basis on the first day of each quarter (30-day grace period), with the exception of 18D and 18S, to be paid on a monthly basis.

The quarterly and monthly dues schedule for Local 18 and its Branches and Owner/ Operator members is as follows:

Local 18 \$66.75 per quarter +2.5% Administrative Dues*

Local 18A \$66.75 per quarter +2.5% Administrative Dues*

Local 18B \$66.75 per quarter +2.5% Administrative Dues*

Local 18C \$51.75 per quarter (Shops) +1.5% Administrative Dues* only when working for Dealer/Rental Shops. 2.5% Administrative Dues when working for other shops, i.e., Highway Heavy Companies*

Local 18C \$57.75 per quarter (Stone Quarries, Material Yards, etc.)

Local 18D \$24.50 per month

Local 18G Two times the employee's hourly rate per month to be paid quarterly

Local 18RA \$66.75 per quarter +2.5% Administrative Dues*

Local 18S Two times the employee's hourly rate plus \$10.00 per month to be paid monthly


Owner Operator members \$150.75 per quarter

Reduced Dues \$45.75 per quarter

Contributions or gifts to I.U.O.E. Local 18 are not deductible as charitable contributions for federal income tax purposes.

*The Executive Board, at its January 25, 2020 meeting, approved a resolution to Article VIII, Section 1, of the Bylaws, decreasing the administrative dues to 2.5% of gross wages for all members of Local 18, 18A, 18B, and 18RA. The Executive Board also approved a decrease of administrative dues to 1.5% of gross wages for 18C equipment shop members. Local 18C Quarry and Sand & Gravel Pit members, Local 18D, Local 18G, and Local 18S members dues will remain unchanged. The decrease is effective on April 1, 2020.



REPORT TO THE MEMBERS

Brothers and sisters, we are full speed ahead into the 2022 construction season in all districts. Tis the season for orange barrels and work zones all across our jurisdiction. Keep in mind that these are your fellow members and fellow trades brothers and sisters in these work zones, so please be careful when you are in these areas.

The referral decks continue to be at record levels for this time of year, and the work hours are up compared to previous years. All of the additional work is a direct result of the additional money from the federal in-

frastructure bill that was passed late last year. As a general reminder, if you do experience a layoff, please be sure to immediately get your registration card back to one of our district offices so we can fill work orders as they come in.

With all of the current and up-

coming work, we are expecting job opportunities for all of our members who want to work this year. It is not unusual for our referral deck numbers to be at their lowest between June and September, and it seems to happen all at once at the beginning of the construction season as many are recalled back to work.

We hear all the time from the members that they heard "the hall is empty," which is never a true statement. As I stated, the number of members registered and out of work is lower this time of year; however, we are never out of operators. Local 18 has always had a plan in place as well as ongoing strategies to avoid a situation where our referral is empty in any of our offices. As you are aware, we have a fulltime organizing staff that not only focuses on signing new contractors, but also assists in supplying operators in a time of need. We also have our apprenticeship program that has shifted to accepting applications all season long, so if additional classes are necessary, we will immediately begin them.

Another source is the individuals who just come into a district office and register off the street and pay the registration fee to get on E-deck. This may be the lowest deck; however, when the work is plentiful, the chances of getting a call to go out to work are better than average.

We never like to hear the membership or anyone else spreading the false statement of "the hall is empty," not only because it is not true, but also because this could result in contractors assigning our work to someone other than an operator,

as they assumed we didn't have operators available. If you hear this while out on the job or from a contractor, have them immediately contact one of the district offices, and we will correct it.

The membership in District 1 recently ratified the Construction Employ-

ers Association (CEA) Building Agreement for a 3-year term. I want to thank the negotiating committee from the union and the contractor's side for their efforts to get this accomplished. In the past, there has been numerous disagreements and jurisdictional issues between the CEA and Local 18. We discussed at length all the current and past issues and are working on identifying a path to correcting these moving forward. This will not happen overnight as the issues did not arise overnight; however, all parties agreed that our current situation is not beneficial to the membership. We look forward to the next three years of this agreement and building on a better relationship.

Please mark your calendars for the semi-annual state membership meeting on Sunday, June 12th, at the Hilton Hotel located at 8700 Lyra Dr, Columbus, OH 43240, @ 10:00 a.m. We typically have our state meetings at the end of the month, but due to a scheduling conflict with the hotel at the

About halfway through March, it didn't feel like spring was ever going to arrive in Ohio, and then in the blink of an eye, we skipped spring and jumped straight into summer! Work is booming across the state, and new projects are popping up in

Some of the larger projects you will read

about in this issue of the *Buckeye Engineer* had Local 18's dispatchers working overtime to fill the seats. The BP shutdown work in District 2 and various solar farm projects in multiple districts have put many op-

erators to work this year. Our regular established contractors were looking to hire more operators due to the uptick in work, as were some of the newly signed contractors who reached out to become signatories with Local 18 for the high skill level the Local 18 members bring to the job site every day. We never stop trying to create more jobs for our members and increase market share.

With all the dispatcher activity, I thought it might be a good time to bring up some reminders about our referral system to the seasoned veterans and possibly some helpful tips to newer members. Feel free to pass these along to your co-workers.

Don't forget your 30-day check-in: Members who have registered for referral are required to call at least once every 30 days to check-in. This is so that we can verify you are still seeking work and that we have a working phone number for you. If we don't hear from you every 30 days, we will send you a courtesy postcard reminder asking you to contact the dispatcher as

soon as possible to avoid your card being pulled from the deck.

We also will send courtesy postcards to you if we have been unable to contact you over a series of days for multiple work orders. This is to make sure that we have the correct phone number information for you. Many times, members will change phone numbers and forget to notify the union hall.

Mark your certifications: Place checkmarks in the boxes at the top of the registration card for your certifications when you fill the card out, and when you get new certifications, make sure you call the dispatcher so they can mark them on your

> card. We don't want to see you miss out on a job just because you forgot to mark your CDL or STP credentials.

Call the dispatcher when you get direct recalled: If a prior employer directly recalls you

back to work, make sure to give the dispatcher a call and let them know that you went back to work. They will ask you for some information to update your work record in the office, such as name of employer, your start date, where the job is located, and the equipment you will be operating. It's important to do this because if the dispatcher doesn't know you were recalled to work and calls you for a job, and you are back to work operating a piece of equipment and can't hear the phone ring, the dispatcher will end up waiting 10 minutes before calling the next member on the deck. Ten minutes doesn't sound like a lot, but if only six people don't answer their phone, that's an hour out of the day that could be used calling members on the list.

In closing, I want to thank you all for taking the time to read my report. I am proud to be a member of Local 18, and I appreciate the trust you put into the leadership of Local 18 as we work to better the lives and working conditions of Local 18 members.

The work season is now in full swing, and the staff of the Fringe Benefit Office hopes that you stay safe and have a healthy and enjoyable summer with family and friends.

The work picture continues to look good, and the Fringe

Benefit Funds have seen the hours and employer contributions up slightly over last year.

We recently rolled out an email address, mra@ooefbp.com, for participants to submit Medical Reimbursement Account ("MRA") claims electronically. This should help reduce the amount of time it normally would take to send an MRA request through the mail. Please be sure to include a completed MRA request form signed by the member, along with a clear image of an itemized bill, which should include the patient's name, date of service, service(s) rendered, amount of the service, and the

provider information. If the participant has other insurance, please include an explanation of benefits from that insurance carrier. MRA reimbursement will be made to the member, or if you prefer, payment can be made directly to a provider. The MRA request form is available online through the member portal at OOEXG.com.

The trustees of the Health and Welfare Plan are continuing to partner with Life Line Screening to provide vital health screenings to identify stroke risk, high blood pressure, peripheral arterial disease, aortic aneurysms, high cholesterol, and diabetes. Letters and vouchers have been mailed to those who have not yet participated in the free screenings in the past year. The screenings are free of charge to eligible plan participants and their spouses and only take about an hour to complete. If you did not receive a letter or have misplaced it, please contact the Fund Office for a replacement. We would like to encourage you to take advantage of this valuable benefit, which could potentially save your life.

The Pension Fund remains well-funded

due to the sound investment approach adopted and maintained by the trustees. At the time this article was submitted for publication, the net assets of the Pension Fund were more than \$3 billion. The Pension Fund is currently paying out \$13.5 million monthly, or \$162 million annually, to 7,442 retirees and surviving spouses.

The scholarship application period for the 2022-2023 academic year closed on April 1, 2022. The Education and Safety Fund trustees met in April and awarded \$3,900.00 for regular scholarships and \$5,500.00 for industry-related scholarships for the upcoming school year. In addition, five special dependent awards of \$7,500.00 will be presented this month at the semi-annual state membership meeting in Columbus to a dependent in each district who is pursuing an education in a construction industry-related course of study. We wish to congratulate all of the scholarship recipients. More than \$995,000 in Education and Safety Fund benefits has been paid to Local 18 members and their qualified dependents for the 2021-2022 academic year.

So far, 2022 is looking to be another outstanding work year for Local 18 and its members. There is an abundance of Highway Heavy and Building work this year, and in addition to this, there is also a large amount of work in the Solar Energy

market, both now and in the foreseeable future. The Organizing Department has been very active and has been able to sign multiple contractors working in Ohio's Solar Energy Market, as well as in the other areas of our work scope.

With this in mind, I am happy to report that so far this year, Local 18's Organizing Department has been able to sign 21 new contractors to one of our agreements that had never been signed before. Organizing these contractors allows us to continue building our membership, beat our attrition rates, and create new job opportunities for Local 18's membership.

We are also continuing to build relationships with all of the developers in the energy market – solar, wind, and gas – with the goal of enabling our existing contractors a fair opportunity to bid on these projects. It is imperative that we capture as much of this work as possible.

We are also continuing to keep the pressure up on out-of-state non-signatory contractors, such as Glenn O. Hawbaker and a few steelworker companies that are trying to get a foothold in Ohio. We will continue to keep you posted on these issues as they progress.

Apprenticeship and Training

Brothers and sisters, the Apprenticeship and Training Program has been updating and streamlining some of our processes throughout recent years. We are always excited to keep up and then get ahead of what is needed for the future of our members.

We have rolled out our apprenticeship app for cell phone access. The app is accessible in the Google Play Store for Android users by typing "Ohio Operating Engineers Apprenticeship." For those with IOS phones, please contact any training center, and we can send you an invite to the app. On the app, you are able to see what classes are being offered, and if you are interested in attending that class, you can click on the "interested" tab to sign up.

The application process for the Apprenticeship Program has also been updated. Applications are accepted year-round online at local18training.com. After applying, we will contact the applicant to schedule a test date and time. This process has already shortened the application and testing process from four and a half hours to one and a half. The new process will allow us to make quick adjustments to bring in new apprentices as work demand increases.

New rules and regulations from The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) as of February 7, 2022, have changed the way to obtain a Commercial Driver's License (CDL). Members wanting to obtain a Class A or Class B CDL must

take Entry Level Driver Training (ELDT). The easiest way to explain it is "Driver's Ed" for CDL. Every training center will be offering ELDT classes for any members interested. This will be a 32-hour class to comply with regulations.

Please make sure that all your certifications are up to date. CCO refreshers and exam dates are all found on our web page, app, and in our schedule books. It is important for all of us to stay ahead or risk the chance of being left behind.

Safety

On January 1, 2022, an operator was sitting in a forklift waiting for work to start. A crew came up behind the forklift and unloaded a generator from a pick-up truck, placing it behind the forklift. When the operator of the forklift was

dispatched by radio to another part of the project, the operator backed up, crushing the generator.

Be aware of your surroundings, and don't let crew members place items around your staging area. The operator could also have prevented the accident by performing a 360-degree walkaround before moving the equipment.

On January 18, 2022, two mechanics lifted and secured the cab of a loader to allow easy access to perform repairs. After the work was done, one mechanic helped raise the cab off of the support and began lowering it into place. The gas shock, meant to keep the cab from free falling, had failed, causing the cab to fall, striking the mechanic on the leg, causing a deep muscle and bone bruise.

To prevent an accident of this type, never place yourself beneath stored energy, in the line of fire, or near pinch points.

On January 24, 2022, an operator was running an RT forklift. When the operator set down the load and proceeded to back up, a conduit was struck, crushing it and causing a power outage across the worksite. There were no injuries.

To prevent an accident of this type, utilize a spotter while backing up. The

operator could also step out of the cab and visually check the immediate surroundings before moving in a congested area.

On February 11, 2022 an operator was walking in the parking lot when a slip and fall occurred causing a sprained shoulder.

Use caution and avoid walking on ice if possible. Salt all walking surfaces and make sure ice and snow is clear.

On February 14, 2022 an operator stepped out of their forklift onto ice and snow. The operator slipped causing a fall and injury when they struck their head. The operator was taken to the ER with reports of blurred vision and possible concussion.

To prevent an accident of this type, park equipment in a safe area that has been cleared of ice and snow. Also, use three points of contact while mounting and dismounting equipment.

Governor DeWine increases aid for local bridges Funding will be directed to bridges that need it most

Ohio Governor Mike DeWine announced that he is increasing Ohio's yearly funding allocation for local bridge projects by \$47.5 million for the next five years, bringing Ohio's annual investment in county and municipal bridges to \$112.5 million per year.



maintained by the state's 88 county engineers will increase from \$34 million to \$74 million annually, and municipal-owned bridge funding will increase from \$11 million to \$18.5 million each year.

The additional \$47.5 million is part of the \$104 million in bridge funding that Ohio will receive in each of the next five years as part of the recently enacted federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The law requires Ohio to invest \$15.6 million of the \$104 million each year into bridges owned by municipalities, townships, and counties, but Governor DeWine's announcement today more than triples the amount going to local communities.

"Many of the expensive repairs needed on small, locally-owned bridges cost far beyond what our communities can afford, which is why I've directed ODOT to devote more money to support local bridge projects," said Governor DeWine. "By partnering together to ensure the necessary improvements are made, those driving over Ohio's bridges can feel confident that they are safe."



Governor DeWine also announced today that small locally-owned bridges would also be eligible for funding as part of ODOT's Local Major Bridge Program, bringing the total number of eligible bridges from 54 to 238. The program pays for up to 80 percent of the construction and engineering costs for major bridge projects with a cap of \$20 million.

"ODOT will continue to aggressively address bridges throughout the state that are under our jurisdiction while at the same time doing everything we can to ensure our local partners have the resources they need to address their most critical issues," said ODOT Director Jack Marchbanks.

Local governments can apply for ODOT funding through the ODOT Office of Local Programs website. Ohio's 88 County Engineers will continue to apply for funding through dedicated programs managed by the County Engineers Association of Ohio.

ODOT's total local bridge investment of \$112.5 million in each of the next five years combines the new federal funding with other programs that aid local governments. The total investment for both state and local bridges is \$407.5 million per year.

Legal

The following is an updated report of activities regarding pending cases with Local 18 and its members since my last report in July 2021.

LOCAL 18 v. TEAMSTERS LOCAL 100 & LABORERS LOCAL 534 (Stein, Inc. ULP): After Stein, Inc. recognized Local 18 as the majority representative of its employees, both Teamsters Local 100 and Laborers Local 534 filed unfair labor practice charges ("ULP"). The National Labor Relations Board ("Board" or "NLRB") issued an order finding a breach of the National Labor Relations Act ("NLRA"). The Union and the employer have since filed independent appeals of the Board's order in the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. Those appeals remain pending.

LOCAL 18 v. ISRAEL SWORD (ULP): Union member Israel "Bo" Sword filed a ULP charge with the NLRB alleging a breach of the Union's duty of fair representation and the Board subsequently issued a Complaint alleging that Local 18 breached its duty of fair representation. The Union has denied all wrongdoing and defended the matter at a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge who recently issued an adverse decision. The Union has appealed that decision to the Board.

LOCAL 18 v. HEIDI REAMS: Former Union employee Heidi Reams filed a complaint with the EEOC alleging that she was terminated due to a disability. The Union denied all wrongdoing and participated in the EEOC's investigatory process. Recently, Ms. Reams filed a discrimination claim against Local 18 in Federal Court. The Union has once again denied all liability and is defending against the claim.

LOCAL 18 v. STEVEN HANK (State Court Complaint): Local 18 member Steven Hank filed a charge with Ohio Civil Rights Commission ("OCRC") alleging that Local 18 engaged in discriminatory conduct. That

case was eventually litigated in federal and state court. After extended litigation, Mr. Hank voluntarily dismissed his claims. Recently, Mr. Hank refiled his Complaint in state court. The Union has once again denied all wrongdoing and is once again vigorously defending that claim.

LOCAL 18/Nate Muhammed NORTHEAST OHIO REGIONAL SEW-ER DISTRICT: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to terminate a Union member's seniority. The matter was then referred to arbitration. an Arbitrator selected, a hearing held, and post-hearing briefs were submitted to the Arbitrator. Recently, the Arbitrator issued an opinion finding that the employer improperly terminated the member's seniority and ordered that the employer reinstate that seniority, retroactively. The matter is now closed.

LOCAL 18 v. 1100 SUPERIOR, INC.: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to refrain from paying overtime for certain assignments. The matter was referred to arbitration, an arbitrator was selected, and a hearing held. Recently, the Arbitrator issued an Opinion & Order denying the Union's grievance after finding that recent changes to the CBA's management rights clause "allows the Employer to schedule the work of Operating Engineers in a manner which avoids the utilization of overtime." The matter is now closed.

LOCAL 18/Bernard Gray v. CUYAHOGA MUNICIPAL HOUSING AUTHORITY: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to terminate a Union member's employment. The matter was referred to arbitration, an arbitrator was selected, a hearing held, and post-hearing briefs were submitted. Recently, the Arbitrator issued an opinion finding that the employer improperly terminated the member and ordering the employer to reinstate the member with full back-pay and benefits.

LOCAL 18/Scott Fout v. STONECO, INC.:The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to discipline a Union member. The matter was referred to arbitration, an Arbitrator was selected, and a hearing held. During that hearing, the parties were able to reach a negotiated settlement whereby the affected member was made whole.

LOCAL 18 v. HENKELS & MCCOY, INC.: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to pay a reduced rate to Local 18 members working in Kentucky. An arbitrator has been selected, and we are in the process of scheduling a hearing date.

LOCAL 18 v. MICHELS CORP.: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to pay a reduced meal rate to Local 18 members. We are in the process of selecting an arbitrator to preside over this matter.

LOCAL 18 v. OHIO CAT: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to change the frequency of performance reviews which are tied to wages. The matter was referred to arbitration, an arbitrator was selected, and a hearing has been rescheduled for May of 2022.

LOCAL 18 v. SOLVAY CORP.: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision as it relates to the benefits made available to retirees. The matter was referred to arbitration and an arbitrator was selected, however, that Arbitrator recused himself for health reasons. We are now in the process of selecting a new arbitrator.

LOCAL 18/Kenneth Ballard v. CUYAHOGA MUNICIPAL HOUSING AUTHORITY: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision to terminate a Union member's employment. The matter has been referred to arbitration and we are in the process of selecting an arbitrator.

One group of stationary engineers that Local 18S represents is the group of members employed at Lorain Metropolitan Housing Authority (LMHA). The 21 members here are Skilled Maintenance, Head Maintenance, Team Leaders, Maintenance, Locksmiths, Maintenance Technician, and Custodian. LMHA provides low to moderate-income housing for people in Lorain, Elyria, Amherst, Oberlin, and various areas around Lorain County. Our members are responsible for approximately 1,500 public housing units in 12 different locations around the county.

The Local 18S members maintain the

entire LMHA operation from the physical standpoint with little outside contracting work. Before units are rented out to new tenants, they must be inspected and, if necessary, refurbished. Our members are responsible for completing any repairs in respect to general maintenance, painting, plumbing, and electrical that a unit may require. Our members are also responsible for exterior maintenance, trash pickup, some lawn care, and snow removal, as needed. With so many buildings and units, our members are in constant demand.

Another group to mention from Local 18S are members employed by Jones Lang LaSalle working in four separate locations in and around the City of Cleveland at PNC Bank's main locations. Currently, 17 members from 18S are working in four classifications of Chief Engineer, Stationary Engineer, Maintenance Mechanic, and Maintenance Mechanic Assistant to maintain the approximate 1.4 million square feet of building space. The members are in charge of all aspects of heating and cooling, including some maintenance work such as locksets, carpentry, light electrical, and coordinating all subcontractor work needed in the buildings and annual testing required for life safety.

CBRE Stationary is comparable in skill sets but focuses more on building maintenance for six different campuses. Four of these are located here in Columbus, Ohio, one in Indianapolis, Indiana, and another in Louisville, Kentucky. CBRE is a global continued on page 41

With Heavy Highway work expected to increase this year, building work is getting up and running again after the past two years of COVID-related shutdowns, plus one of the largest maintenance shutdowns in decades, District 2 and its members are expecting another busy year. Be ready for the work season by keeping your skills sharp and your certifications up to date. The best way to do that is to attend our training facilities often. Here is a brief rundown of the work going on in District 2.

Underground Utilities Inc. is currently working on contracts "A" and "B" on the East Regional waterline improvement project in Allen County. Underground Utilities Inc. will install new water lines and fire hydrants from West Minster to the Villages of Harrod and Lafayette, serving all residents of both communities. Completion will be October 2022.

Roese Pipeline continues its contract work with Dominion Gas replacing antiquated distribution gas lines in Allen County. Roese is currently finishing up a steel gas line project in the Columbus Grove area.

Degen Excavating has been awarded the Gomer sewer improvements project in northwest Allen County. This project is being constructed due to a non-compliance complaint from the EPA nearly eight years ago. Now that funding is finally in place, construction is scheduled to begin this summer.

Gerken Paving got an early start to their season by kicking off the U.S. Rt. 30 four-lane resurfacing project in Allen County this Spring. This 12-mile section starts near the U.S. Rt. 30/S.R. 65 intersection and runs to the west. Gerken was also the low bidder on a second ODOT rehabilitation project in

Allen and Defiance Counties. Part 1 consists of resurfacing more four-lane on U.S. Rt. 30, and Part 2 will entail resurfacing State Routes 2, 18, and 49 in the Villages of Hicksville and Sherwood in Defiance County.

Helms & Sons is improving two intersections on S.R. 309 in Allen County. This project consists of converting existing two-way stop-controlled intersections to single-lane roundabout intersections at Thayer Rd. and Napoleon Rd. just west of Lima. New curb

and gutter, drainage, signage, and asphalt are all parts of this project.

To continue the roundabout theme in Allen County, R.B. Jergens is modifying the current "roundabout" intersection in the square of Lima on Market St. and Main

St. The new upgraded roundabout will eliminate the indecisiveness of motorists who enter this intersection; thus, reducing motor vehicle incidents.

Industrial Resource Group continues to employ a couple operating engineers on the Hardin Solar II project maintaining access roads. This 170-megawatt solar farm is located west of Kenton, and this project should be complete by early fall 2022.

The beginning of Summer 2022 in District 3 presents a variety of projects for our members. Kokosing has operators on three ODOT projects in downtown Columbus. The first is the "2-E" project, where I-70 and I-71 intersect. It is a major reconstruction/ realignment with cast in place and MSE retaining walls. There are multiple bridge demos with new, redesigned replacements. Subcontractors have included U.S. Utility Contractors, Lake Erie Construction, Turn-Key Tunneling, Capital City Group Crane Rental, Danbert, K D Complete Clearing, Miller Cable, M P Dory Co., and Phenix Stabilization. The second is the Broad St./I-71 Columbus Crossroads. This project includes reconstructing the East Broad St. bridge over I-71, the elimination of entrance and exit ramps, lane additions, and retaining walls. Subcontractors include MP Dory Co., Complete General Construction, Armstrong Steel, Paul Peterson Co., and West Fairfield Inc. The third is the ODOT "4-R" project on I-70 at I-71 and S.R. 315. This multi-year project features 12 bridges, including some that will span the Scioto River, as well as the Norfolk Southern and CSX railroads. It is scheduled for completion in late 2025.

tion in late 2025.

Granite Construction has members working on the Lower Olentangy Tunnel (LOT Tunnel), which connects from the Olentangy Scioto Interceptor Sewer Tunnel (OARS Tunnel) to the Driving Park neighborhood and includes a three-mile micro-tunnel. Subcontractors for this project include Keller North America, Schnabel, George J. Igel & Co., Goettle, and Ward & Burke. Park Enterprise and Trucco have residential site work in Central Ohio's expanding housing market. Work at The Ohio State

University is plentiful with approximately 200 operators working on various major projects, including the expansion of the Wexner Medical Center main hospital, the new OSU/Nationwide Children's Hospital Ambulatory Center, an animal research center, a large greenhouse, and an additional steam/ power plant. It was announced that four to five additional projects are in the works. Subcontractors include Columbus Steel Erectors, Maxim Crane, Capital Tunneling, Great Lakes, Suburban Maintenance, McDaniels Construction, and Superior working for Frank Lill. George J. Igel & Co. also has several projects on the OSU campus this season.

Nationwide Children's Hospital has four projects being built on Livingston Avenue, including two parking garages, utility tunnels, and a new behavioral health tower that will mirror the current 12-story tower at Parsons and Livingston Avenues. The new tower will be located to the north between the current tower and I-70, with an estimated cost of \$3.3 billion.

In the Arena District, a 31-story mixeduse high rise will begin mid-year. It is billed as an entertainment and work complex with businesses on the lower floors, restaurants, workout facilities, retail space, and multiple living spaces. This goes along with continued on page 26

When reading more about it online, the benefits of enough Vitamin D for our bodies include strengthening our bones, and not getting enough of it can possibly lead to a higher risk of Type 1 Diabetes, elevated blood pressure, rheumatoid arthritis, multiple sclerosis, muscle and bone pain, cancer of the breast, colon, prostate, ovaries, esophagus, and lymphatic system. Vitamin D can slow down cancer cell growth, stimulate the pancreas to make insulin, and regulate our immune system. Quite a list - a Vitamin that helps our whole body to function better and helps to keep us healthier overall.



The best producer of Vitamin D isn't our local vitamin producer and doesn't cost any money, most times unless we need an extra dose and want to take a vacation to soak up more of it! The sun is our best activator, and it activates our body to produce Vitamin D when our skin is exposed to it. Studies show that in more northern countries and states where there is less sunshine, many of the health problems I listed above are more common in those areas.

Some foods naturally have small amounts of Vitamin D, many foods that are fortified with Vitamin D, but most often, combined, not enough to get us what we need to keep us healthy in the long run. Regular exposure to sunlight is the biggest and best source of Vitamin D for most people. Some people take regular Vitamin D supplements and increase the level in the winter months, but regular exposure to the sun is key.

The rule of thumb my doctor told me, when my body starts tanning from the sun exposure, lessen my Vitamin D supplement. When my tan starts fading, increase my Vitamin D supplement. (I don't get real tan or seek a tan, but I'm outdoors on a regular basis and get some coloring even with sun-

screen.) It doesn't sound like it takes a lot of sun exposure if you are wondering about the threat of skin cancer. Five to ten minutes, three times per week, is usually enough.

It is possible to get tests taken through a doctor to see if we are getting enough Vitamin D. Based on the benefits and information available today, it sounds like many people are Vitamin D deficient and that it may be worth asking your doctor to test your Vitamin D level, sun exposure, and about taking supplements. Also, as they always say, talk to your doctor if you have concerns or want to learn more about supplements and what is best for you medically and physically.

The sun is starting to shine a bit more these days as spring has sprung. Get those hands out of your gloves, those legs out of long pants, those arms out of long sleeves, and of course, those feet out of boots every so often, and bask in the sun for a few minutes a day. You never know, it might change your life!

LOCAL 18/Ryan Schmidt v. AREA AGGREGATES, INC.: The Union filed a grievance challenging the employer's decision not to recall a Union member to employment. The matter has been referred to arbitration and we are in the process of selecting an arbitrator.

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Also in Hardin County, Bluffton Contracting will be replacing an antiquated storm sewer on Gormley St. in Forest. The Shelly Company picked up a county road resurfacing project in Hardin County that entails repairing and resurfacing County Road 75 and County Road 180.

U.S. Utility Contractors has been awarded a sidewalk improvement project in Oakwood. Workers will be constructing new concrete and brick-paved sidewalks, along with new concrete curb, and upgrading the light-

A new bridge deck, underdrains, curb and gutter, catch basins, and a new roundabout at the intersection of U.S. Rt. 127/U.S. Rt. 224 and Marsh Rd., north of the City of Van Wert, are all part of this project. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin late spring, with completion slated for late fall.

Miller Brothers Construction is replacing an antiquated bridge on S.R. 49 at mile marker 5.24 just south of Wren in Van Wert County. This single-span continuous steel beam with reinforced concrete deck structure will be constructed over Twentyseven Mile Creek. Jeffers Crane Services will





assist in setting the beams, Ebony Construction will perform the milling/paving, and Lake Erie Construction will install new guardrail. Completion is late August 2022.

The Shelly Company is gearing up to start a widening project on Grill, Kear, and Bonnewitz Streets in Van Wert. This project starts just east of U.S. Rt. 127 and runs just past the Van Wert County Engineers Office. New curb and gutter, storm sewer manholes, and asphalt are all parts of this widening project. Completion is slated for late fall 2022.

Also in Van Wert County, Eclipse will be replacing two culverts on S.R. 116 at mile marker 2.16 and mile marker 11.67.

In Hancock County, Shelly is resurfacing approximately 10 miles of S.R. 12, starting at the Hancock-Putnam County Line heading toward Findlay. BCC Ohio will repair the culverts, Smith Paving & Excavating will perform all concrete related construction, and Boca will install the rumble strips. Completion is projected by mid-July, at which time this crew will start resurfacing numerous county roads in need of repair.

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M&B Asphalt got an early start to the season by starting the Bright Road Phase II improvements project in Findlay. Smith Paving & Excavating is performing all concrete work, Ebony Construction will mill the wearing course, and M&B Asphalt will lay a new asphalt surface on the entire project running from U.S. Rt. 224 north to S.R. 12.

M&B Asphalt also picked up the Hancock County Township/County Roads 2022 resurfacing project. The company will be laying approximately 18,000 tons of asphalt on various county/township roads.

Kirk Brothers Company is continuing its work at the City of Fostoria Wastewater Treatment Plant. This project, which began nearly 20 months ago, is finally proceeding nicely after several unforeseen delays along the way. Construction is anticipated to be completed this summer.

Beaver Excavating is once again building a new cell for Sunny Farms Landfill in Seneca County. This 10-acre additional cell will give the landfill enough space for only one additional year. Our signatory contractors have been very successful in procuring work for our membership at this location. This project will keep eight to 10 operating engineers working through early September.

Well over 800-million dollars have been spent to fund the expansion of the North Star Blue Scope Steel Plant in Delta. Rudolph Libbe is overseeing the project and performing the site work. The project has added a furnace and a slab caster to

production. Jeffers Crane Service, Capital City, Don Fruchey Inc., Dunbar Mechanical LLC, Henry Gurtzweiler Inc., and GEM have been brought in as subcontractors. With the addition of the Melt Shop, it is expected that North Star will add 950,000 metric tons of steel to the 2.3 million metric tons North Star already produces annually, an increase of about 40%.

Just off of S.R. 109 and the Ohio Turnpike in Delta, Mosser has completed the site drainage and prep work on the \$75 million construction of Nova Tube and Steel's new facility. Tenmile Creek is performing stabilization for the drives and beautification of the site. Foundation Steel has completed the structural steel, and

IPS has moved into the building to install piping. Nova Tube & Steel is a Canadian-based company that processes and distributes carbon steel, stainless steel, and aluminum products and operates as an intermediary between primary metal producers and manufacturers. The plant will be 250,000 sq. ft. and will utilize the latest advanced manufacturing technology with Ohio talent to support growing demand in the North American market.

In Wood County, Rudolph Libbe is busy with an expansion on the 1.1-million sq. ft. First Solar Manufacturing Facility built in 2018. The 1.9-million sq. ft. addition, with an estimated price tag of \$680 million, had continued on page 24

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site work start in early 2021. Nick Kostecki Excavating did the mass excavation and the bulk of the earthwork. Rudolph Libbe is self-performing the rest of the site work, and they are about 70% finished. Capital City Group was brought in for the precast and structural work, which is now complete. This job has a pretty aggressive schedule, but with the large host of operating engineers working on site, the project is moving along well. The permanent roof has been started with about 50% of the decking complete. With the walls up and the roof started, between the foundations and the flooring, only about 80% of the concrete needed to finish this job has actually been poured, and about 60% of the utilities have been installed. This project will have operating engineers working well into December of 2022. Once this addition is up and running along with the previous two First Solar sites in the area, it has been said that Ohio will be second only to China when it comes to the manufacturing of solar panel materials.

In Lucas County, E.S. Wagner continues rebuilding I-75 between Dorr St. and South Ave. Currently, both inbound ramps are closed for demolition and realignment. The reconfigured ramps, when complete, will enter I-75 from the right lane side, not the left, which will be a major safety improvement. The project is scheduled to be com-

St. in Toledo, Northwood, and Rossford and is seeing some progress. The five-year mega project will widen I-75 to three lanes in each direction. The northern section through the downtown area will be completed late next year, while the southern section will be completed in 2023. Currently, Kokosing's demolition of the northbound I-75 bridge is complete, and construction of the new northbound bridge has begun.

The City of Toledo and Metroparks Toledo continue to award projects for the development of the riverfront in East Toledo on a property that stretches from the I-280 Veterans Skyway Bridge to International Park. Mosser Construction has completed driving piling for the earthen berm bridge that will be used by hikers, bicyclists, skaters, and others to get between parks. The goal of this development is to stimulate investment in a part of Toledo that historically has been financially neglected.

In 2021 Mosser began work on a pedestrian and bicycle bridge over Main St. in East Toledo to connect the trail at International Park with the new Glass City Metropark. The 110-foot-long, 20-foot-wide bridge is in the location of a former railroad bridge and lines up with the existing path through International Park to Navarre Avenue. The project includes a 0.7-mile-long 12-foot-wide asphalt bike path from Main St. to Marina Drive, through glass City Metropark. Approaches are complete, and the bridge is assembled and waiting to be set.

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A recently released project called Phase 2 will bring a number of other amenities including

- A 9,000-square foot market hall.
- An ice-skating ribbon along with six cabanas.
- · A hammock village.
- A man-made pond.

Union Contractors awarded on this project are Delventhal, Mosser, Foundation Steel, and Earl Mechanical.

Mosser Construction continues construction work on a building expansion project at the Birchard Public Library. This addition will add a 4,250 sq. ft. wing with a new entrance and parking lot on the west end of the existing building. Mosser has completed the footer and concrete flatwork. Newly signed Link Excavating LLC will excavate for the plumbing contractor

on this project. Kyle Sherman Excavating performed the mass excavation and installation of storm piping and the underground retention system.

ODOT awarded two bridge projects to Great Lake Demolition Company on S.R. 19 between Fremont and Oak Harbor. The first is a single-span composite box beam over Fishing Creek and a three-span composite box beam over Muddy Creek. Great Lakes Demolition expects to start this project in early spring.

Geddis Paving & Excavating is currently working on two projects involving restoration and improvements to local parks in Toledo. The Detwiler Park restoration project will restore 24 acres of wetland habitat through invasive species management, regrading, and native plantings. Thirty-six acres of invasive plant species will be treated, and 1,950 feet of the stream along Mud Creek will be restored by reconnecting to

the flood plain. The second project awarded to Geddis Paving & Excavating is the improvements to Casey Jones Park. This project includes the removal and replacement of existing play equipment, site grading, installation of concrete walkways, curbs, and installation of storm underdrains. Union subcontractors involved in this project are K&R Excavating and Landscaping and Williams Concrete.

At the BP-Husky Toledo Refinery in Toledo, the 2022 turnaround is currently underway. The scope of this turnaround will be the inspection, replacement, and maintenance of over 25 units at the facility. This is expected to be the largest investment and turnaround at the Toledo Refinery, with about three million work hours and about 3,000 craftspeople on site at peak. The 70-day outage has an expected oil-in date of June 30, 2022. Currently, we have 180 operators on days and 125 operators on nights, along with oilers on the required cranes and forklift operators.

Jeffers Crane Service, IPS, GEM, Graham and Barnhart Crane are our union contractors on site. We look forward to a successful outage with no accidents, zero impact on the environment, and a safe start-up when the outage is complete.

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all the other work in this area, including the Hilton Hotel expansion at the Columbus Convention Center, which will be Ohio's first 1.000-room hotel.

Shelly & Sands is hard at work reconstructing South Hamilton Road. This job goes south from I-70 to Refugee Road and includes widening, new sidewalks, box culverts, storm sewer additions, and over 700 structures to be installed. They are also widening North Hamilton Road, with the work scheduled for completion at the end of 2022.

Distribution and Maintenance work is keeping RLA Utilities, Miller Pipeline, and Northern Pipeline busy with about 50 crews. Each company has plans to add

additional crews to keep up with the increased workload. Columbia Gas announced that they would be nearly doubling their workload, which will increase the need for more operators in the Distribution and Maintenance field. The municipalities around Columbus are busy with street reconstruction, paving, water line replacements, and sewer upgrades. In Westerville, Kokosing is working on the Hoover Reservoir Spillway. They also have operators rebuilding a low head dam and refurbishing a clarifying tank at the Hap Cremean Water Treatment Plant on Morse Rd. in Columbus.

In New Albany, Complete General Construction has operators installing new 36inch sanitary sewer trunk line, as well as a new 42-inch sanitary sewer trunk line, which is more than 4,400 linear feet and an average depth of 40 feet. At Project Mustang, George J. Igel & Co. has operating engineers spread out across dirt and pipe crews working on water lines and grading for hardscape. Operators with PKX are also on site. McDaniels Construction has members working on the Amgen Project, a new pharmaceutical plant in New Albany. Capital City Group is also on site at Amgen setting steel. Miller Brothers has members working on dirt and pipe crews at two warehousing projects, and Mr. Excavator is working on the Amazon Data Center.

Shelly & Sands has operators at Rickenbacker Airport working on runway improvements. Trucco Construction has dirt and pipe crews busy at a housing development and a warehouse project in Lockbourne. At Project Cypress in South Columbus, Kokosing Construction is building the pad for a new AEP substation, McDaniels Construction is installing a 24-inch water main, and George J. Igel & Co. has members on site. Kokosing Construction is installing new sanitary trunk line at Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plant in Lockbourne. They also have members working on the I-71 and U.S. Rt. 62 expansion in Grove City, which will widen I-71 to six lanes between Columbus and Cincinnati.

new natural gas line on the project. Infrasource is busy in the Covington area repairing damaged propane lines. Coppage Construction is fighting the wet weather in Richwood to complete a major excavation and site preparation for new warehouses, with many similar projects expected to begin soon. Nelson Stark is dealing with the same conditions on the warehouse development on U.S. Rt. 20 in Hebron. The Greater Cincinnati Airport is once again providing many work hours for the members of Local 18. Kokosing is currently working at the airport moving 700,000 vds of material, and Igel Construction with subcontractor NDK Scrapers has been awarded 400,000 yds of material to be moved. The Harper Company was just awarded the CVG East Service Road replacement project for \$5,111,418.00. Howell Contractors will be busy in Northern Kentucky upgrading the storm discharge system along the Lick-

ing River for \$3.6 million and will keep our members busy for several months. Eastern Counties

In Clermont County, Kokosing Construction has completed the Beechmont Bridge project. Local 18 members working for Kokosing completed placing 23,000 yards of dirt fill and 3,200 feet of steel H-piling. Kokosing also installed a 70-foot-long, 11-foot-high by 16-foot-wide box culvert that serves as a bike path under the ramp that connects the Beechmont and Lunken Airport bike paths. On S.R. 125 and Bach Buxton Rd. Complete General Construction continues work on the intersection safety improvements. Complete General will construct a southbound right turn lane from S.R. 125 onto Bach Buxton; this project consists of the installation of new signalization on both roadways. Also in Clermont County, John R. Jurgensen Company has started work on the major improvement project on S.R. 32 in Eastgate. This project will consist of moving over 100,000 yards of material, along with installing 40,000 feet of new drainage pipe. As sub-contractors, Complete General Construction will be doing the bridgework, and Kokosing Construction will be completing the MSE and center median reflection wall.

In **Highland County**, work has continued on the 300-Megawatt 2000-acre Highland County Solar Farm throughout the winter months. Castle Contracting has performed the site clearing, excavation, and trenching for underground electrical lines for this project. Also in Highland County, Distel Construction has started Phase 3 of the Highland County storm sewer improvement project.

In Clinton County, John R. Jurgensen has completed work on the reconstruction of U.S. Rt. 22. John R. Jurgensen installed 2,000 feet of new water main, 3,000 feet of new 12- to 60-inch storm drain, 70 new catch basins, and manhole structures. Oglesby Construction was on site to install 2,500 feet of new slip form concrete curb and gutter along with paving the new bike path. Also in Clinton County, Complete General Construction is working on the improvement of three intersections on U.S. Rt. 68 in Wilmington. Complete General will be installing new signalization along with new concrete curb, bump-outs, and sidewalk for ADA compliance for ODOT.

In Eastern Hamilton County, on U.S. continued on page 34

Rt. 52, Goettle Inc. has completed work on an earth retention piling project. This project consisted of 162 auger cast pilings that are 48 inches in diameter and 65 feet deep. This project was done to help stabilize pressure exerted from the hillside to prevent a 60-inch water main that provides water to the City of Cincinnati from shifting. Also, in Eastern Hamilton County, Great Lakes Construction has completed a bridge reconstruction of the I-71 overpass at Robertson Ave. Great Lakes removed and replaced the bridge deck, sidewalk, and parapet wall to expose and replace the fascia bridge beam. Bansal Construction completed the electrical relocation work, and Evers Steel assisted with the structural steel.

In **Greene County**, R.B. Jergens has completed work on the County Line Road widening project in Beavercreek. This

project consisted of the installation of onehalf mile of 12-inch stormwater runoff drain, 20 catch basins, and manhole structures. This also included one mile of new concrete curb and gutter and one-half mile of five-foot sidewalk to the east side of the project that also included a half-mile of 10-foot-wide sidewalk to the west side of the project. As a subcontractor, John R. Jurgensen performed the paving. In Beavercreek, R.B. Jergens has started the Factory Rd. widening project. The company will be adding a lane to Factory Rd. from E.J. Nutter Park south to the existing bike path. They will also be adding new stormwater runoff control and catch basins along with a half-mile of new curb and sidewalk.

In Brown County, Castle Contracting continues working on another solar farm project called the Willowbrook Solar I Farm. In total, Castle will be moving 750,000 yds of material along with building 24 water retention basins. They will also be constructing several miles of aggregate roads and trenching approximately 100,000 feet for the direct burial of electrical lines. This project is keeping 15 Local 18 members busy. Also in Brown County, The Shelly Company has started to work on the U.S. Rt. 68 Safety Improvement Project. This project will consist of the installation of a roundabout on U.S. Rt. 68, along with the widening of Sterling Run Blvd.

Distribution and Maintenance

Miller Pipeline continues with the installation of 4,200 feet of 4-and 8-inch natural gas pipe on various streets in Fairborn and will be replacing old services to 100 businesses and residences. In the City of Yellow Springs, Miller Pipeline replaced 2,700 feet of 4-inch natural gas pipe and 30 residential and commercial services.

Shops

Local 18 members working at Ohio CAT - AG at Washington Court House continue repairs and services to various types of farm machinery to help farmers stay ahead of the season.

John R. Jurgensen's shop in Sharonville keeps approximately 40 Local 18 mechanics busy with repairs and services to numerous pieces of equipment to help them continue production with this busy construction and paving season.

Southwestern Counties

In Preble County, The Shelly Company is working on preventative maintenance performing chip-seal operations on S.R. 177 and S.R. 725 from the Butler and Preble Counties line to the Indiana State line and along S.R. 725 from the Indiana State Line to the western corporation limit of the Village of Camden. Boca Construction is performing the milling for this project.

Miller Pipeline will be working on a proj-

ect in New Paris through the summer. This job consists of 1.57 miles of new gas main and will service 143 homes and businesses.

John R. Jurgensen will be returning to the I-70 resurfacing project from last season that runs east and west through the lower part of Preble County, and they will finish the paving of the eastbound lanes this year. Some of the subcontractors for this project are Bansal, with the installation of new overhead lighting at the entrance and exits ramps, and M.P. Dory Company is installing all new guardrail.

Barrett Paving has been awarded six different roads in Preble County that will be milled and repaved as part of the county road repaving program for 2022.

Butler County

Rack & Ballauer is making progress on the five-point intersection at Hamilton Mason Rd., Tylersville Rd., Tuley Rd., Grand Blvd., and Hancock Ave. in Hamilton. The company has finished with the sanitary sewer improvements and is currently working on stormwater runoff. This will turn a dangerous and annoying five-way intersection into a new single-lane roundabout to ease traffic flow and hopefully avoid any accidents. This project will also include new concrete curbs and intersection lighting upgrades. R.A. Miller has picked up the City of Hamilton curb and resurfacing annual street improvement program, which includes the replacement of the old curbs, sidewalks, and street resurfacing. CG Construction & Utilities has completed

Sanders Drive and Leo Drive in Hamilton with the installation of 5,900 feet of 8-inch water main and replacement of 111 residential services. As a subcontractor, R.A. Miller will be slip forming new concrete curbs and sidewalks. John R. Jurgensen will be on site for the course and finish paving. John R. Jurgensen continues to work on the street levy project in the City of Middletown.

Currently, they are performing milling and paving operations on various streets throughout the City of Middletown. Subcontractors on this project will be R.A. Miller with removing and replacing the broken concrete curbs and installing ADA Ramps and Phenix Stabilization performing cement continued on page 36

subbase stabilization to form the base for asphalt paving. For ODOT, John R. Jurgensen is currently performing a mill and pave operation on S.R. 4 in Middletown between Tytus and Germantown Rd. Elsewhere in the City of Middletown, Barrett Paving is doing a rehab of Moore St. from its western terminus to Frazier Dr., which will include the milling and resurfacing of the roadway. Don May Construction is a sub-contractor on this project and will install a new 6-inch cast iron ductal water main with a total length of 1,560 feet, five new fire hydrants, and 19 residential services. Oglesby is also a sub-contractor on this project and will be repairing the concrete curbs and apron as well. McGraw/Kokosing is performing routine maintenance for Cleveland-Cliffs Steel Mill in Middletown and rebuilding the stoves connecting to the blast furnace. Brand Energy and Graycor are also performing building, grounds, and machinery repairs inside the plant.

Over at the transportation facility, Bulk Transport mechanics are busy with repairs to the pot haulers, reach stackers, loaders, and other material handling equipment for the mill. MPW Environmental Services is manning the locomotives and conveyors that handle the coke that comes over from the Sun Coke facility by a conveyer.

Stein operates on several shifts and schedules and does the slag yard handling and recycling of all the slag, which is a byproduct of the steelmaking process. Across the road at the Sun Coke facility, Fluor is working on the buildings, grounds, and machinery repairs inside the plant, and Day & Zimmermann is in the middle of rebuilding the boiler for the coke furnace.

Northwestern Counties

R.B. Jergens continues with the closure of the Republic Waste Landfill in Celina. Over the past few months, R.B. Jergens has continued to move the 50,000 yards of dirt it will take to cap off the landfill. After the dirt has been placed, the company will then hydroseed for new grass to finish this project in late fall. Just to the east of the landfill in Coldwater, The Shelly Company will be working on various city streets in late summer, milling the existing asphalt and laying a new surface. Shelly will be paving on a number of ODOT projects over the summer. The first one is on U.S. Rt. 33 in Mercer County. After completing this mill and fill project, the company will move to the second project in Auglaize County on S.R. 219. In Logan County, Beaver Excavating is working at the Republic Waste Landfill in Bellefontaine. The company started to move 20,000 yards of overburden for the new trash cell in mid-April and will be adding a new cell and moving the final 80,000 yards to complete this project in late summer.

ODOT is keeping a number of contrac-

tors busy in Champaign County on asphalt mill and fill projects. In mid-summer, Barrett Paving will be working on U.S. Rt. 36 and S.R. 560, BOCA will be milling the existing roadway, Blueridge Custom Sweeping will be performing the sweeping after the roadway is milled, and Barrett will be laying the asphalt.

The Shelly Company has been working on S.R. 235 in DeGraff on a mill and fill project. Ebony Construction milled and cleaned up the existing asphalt, and Shelly laid the new surface layer of asphalt. Just to the south in Quincy, Shelly is working on a Chip and Seal Project on S.R. 706 and S.R. 29. This work will be at various locations in Auglaize County and will be completed in mid-Summer. In Shelby County, Eagle Bridge continues with the safety Improvements on S.R. 47 in Sidney. The company has installed new concrete medians that will allow for turning traffic to have a safe lane to egress the state route and turn into local businesses. Barrett Paving has begun the 2022 asphalt resurfacing project in the City of Sidney. Welfle milled the asphalt on this project, and Barrett paving did the cleanup and laid the new surface. Barrett Paving is also working at the Shelby County Airport on the resurfacing of the existing taxiway; this project will be completed in late summer.

Eagle Bridge is working on a bridge replacement on I-75 in Piqua. The south-bound traffic was moved in late March to allow for the existing bridge to be demolished. Eagle Bridge will then be pouring

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new abutments and forming the new slab bridge. Buckeye Concrete Pumping will be on site over the summer, placing the concrete on the bridge deck. After completing the southbound lanes, the traffic will be switched to allow for the northbound bridge to be demolished in early fall. John R. Jurgensen has finished up a mill and fill project on S.R. 4 in Clark County. The company milled over 300,000 sq. yards of existing pavement and laid over 30,000 tons of new surface asphalt to complete the project in mid-spring.

In Montgomery County, there are a number of contractors keeping busy. In the City of Vandalia, John R. Jurgensen is working on the 2022 citywide street resurfacing project. Just to the south of Vandalia on North Dixie Drive, Barrett Paving has been working on a mill and fill project. Welfle milled the asphalt, and Blueridge Custom Sweeping did the cleanup. Barrett then laid the surface layer of asphalt on the two-mile stretch of roadway. Complete General Construction has been working on U.S. Rt. 35 in Dayton removing 400 feet of existing sound bearer wall and relocating it farther off of the existing roadway to allow for the expansion of the exit ramp. After the sound wall was reinstalled, Barrett Paving laid new asphalt on the exit ramp. John R. Jurgensen is working for the City of Dayton on numerous asphalt resurfacing projects. Over the summer, the company will mill and resurface over 50 city streets.

Distribution and Maintenance

Miller Pipeline continues to be busy in the Dayton Area. On Leo St., in Dayton, the company is installing 5,000 feet of 2-inch plastic gas main and reconnecting 34 residential services to the new main. Also, at CAT, several mechanics have been working on a certified powertrain rebuild of a 770 Haul Truck. The truck was dismantled over the spring, and the components were rebuilt and reinstalled. This rebuild allows for a used piece of equipment to be rebuilt and have a factory warranty at a fraction of the cost of a new piece of equipment.

Temporary Extension of Deadlines Due to COVID-19 National Emergency

The federal government announced that the country is under a COVID-19 National Emergency starting March 1, 2020. The period between March 1, 2020 and the 60th day after the announced end of the COVID-19 National Emergency will not count against certain deadlines under the Ohio Operating Engineers Health and Welfare Plan and the Ohio Operating Engineers Pension Plan. The extension applies to deadlines to file a claim or appeal, enroll a new spouse or child, report COBRA qualifying events and to elect and pay for COBRA under the Health and Welfare Plan. The extension also applies to deadlines to file a claim or appeal under the Pension Plan. This may give you a longer time to take certain actions. Please contact the Fringe Benefit Programs Office if you have questions.
